At the forum 'The origins of and developments in European governance: the impact of the Treaty of Rome establishing the European Economic Community (March 1957)', organised on 23 and 24 April 2007 by the Pierre Werner Institute in Luxembourg, key figures who were closely involved in the process, including Georges Berthoin, Charles Rutten, Pierre Pescatore and Jean François-Poncet, gave their account of the beginnings of European integration.
