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WP1 European identity frontiers and the geography of EU symbolic borders

Description and objectives

The main research objective of WP1 is the examination of European identity frontiers as well as that of the evolution of EU symbolic geographical borders over time. Such approach involves an analysis of public perception, historical perspectives, media discourses and communication tools. More specifically, the research focus was developed in three different directions: First of all, clarification of the evolving meaning of borders in contemporary Europe. Secondly, an in-depth study of the roots and implications of different European policy notions which refer to European evolving borders, such as absorption capacity, fortress Europe, neighbourhood, cordon sanitaire, territorial glacis, third countries, exclusive borders, key-regions of Europe and so on. Finally, we attempted to determine the more efficient tools for a thoughtful external communication of the EU taking into account the causes and consequences of borders changes in the continent.
