SUMMARY

The Armoured Divisions Training Centre (C.I.D.B.), on a height on the banks of the Moselle⁽¹⁾, some 5 kms S.W. of Trier, was set up by General DEMETZ and was originally intended for training only the troops of the 1st Armoured Division. Its importance grew, in the course of time, and, after being a training centre for all the armoured units in Germany, it became one of the two training centres (the other is in Algeria) for all French armoured troops.

It has a full-time complement of 2,000 recruits, together with a number of men on courses, which, together with the permanent staff, makes between 3,200 and 3,500 men.

All the recruits are given the same basic training, followed by four months' specialized training for future fighting troops.

The Centre trains drivers, navigators and gunners and also gives infantry weapon training.

The Centre is remarkably well equipped. At the present time it has 143 tanks and movements of materiel are infrequent (six Armoured Reconnaissance Vehicles since 1st January 1959); the number of U.S. tanks has not changed since 1957.

The numbers checked on the records agreed with the figures
